Remember, amidst the fast-paced scrolling and instant messaging, there's a simple joy in finding a handwritten letter waiting for you.



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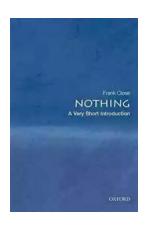

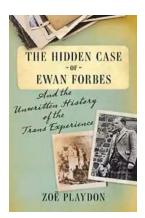
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
