
The Little Known De Gaulle Who Fought To Free Occupied France






"My dear Uncle Charles," twenty-two-year-old Geneviève de Gaulle wrote on May 6, 1943. "Maybe you have already heard about the different events affecting the family." 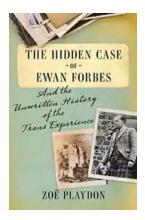


