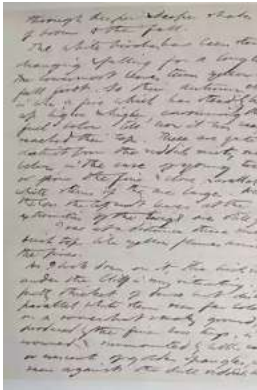

seen against the dull reddish brown
