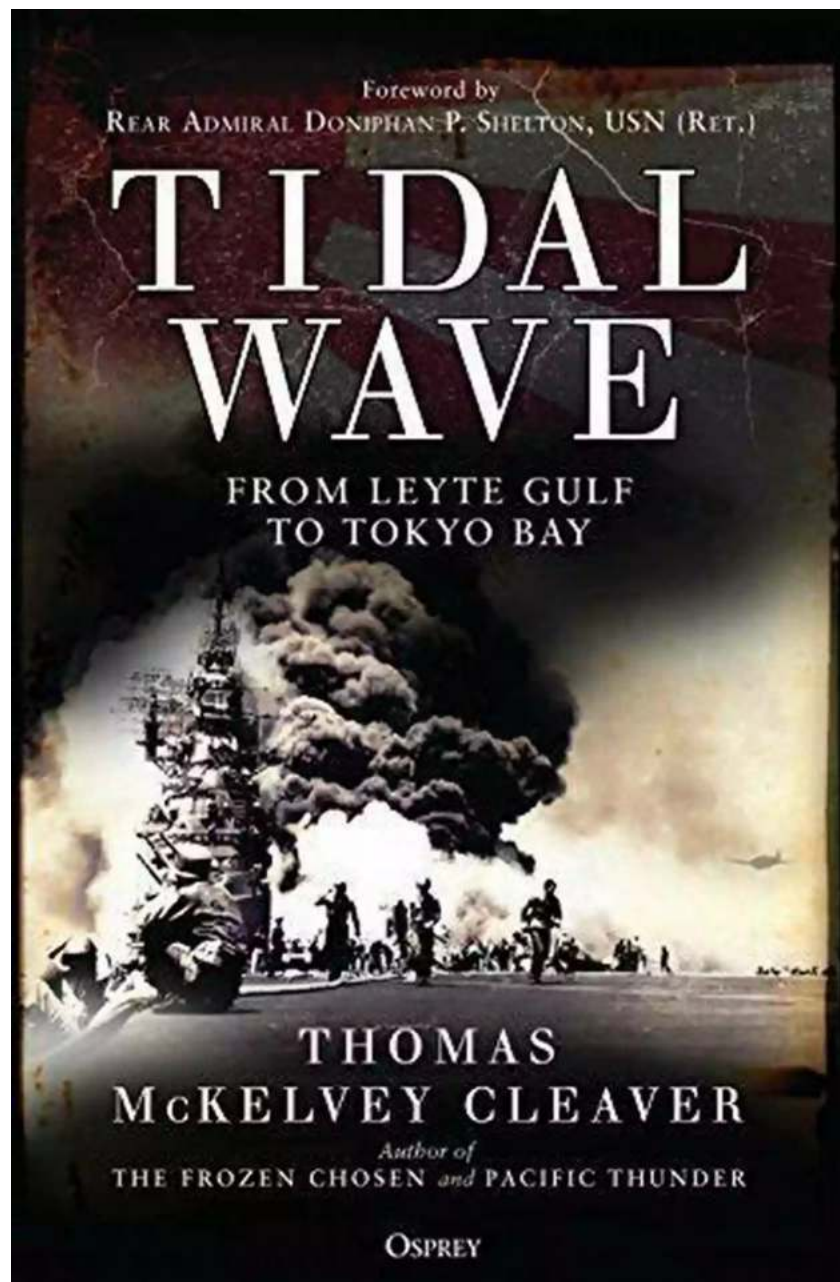
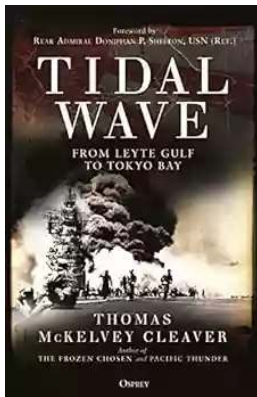


Tidal Wave From Leyte Gulf To Tokyo Bay

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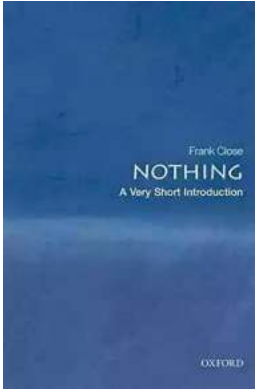
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The United States Navy won such overwhelming victories in 1944 that, had the navy faced a different enemy, the war would have been over at the of the Battle of Leyte Gulf.

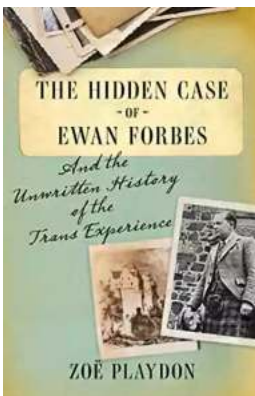
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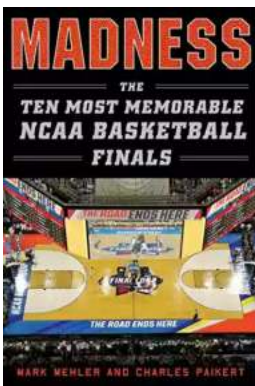
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
