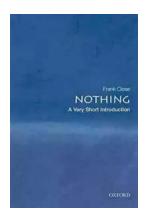

His course of action turns out to be his first experience with learning to live with himself in an honest and accepting way.

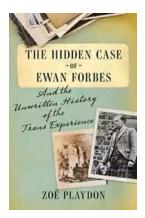
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
